July Meeting:

On the 18th July Mike Perrium gave us a talk entitled 'Exeter's Buildings'. Mike spoke first about the Roman fortress & settlement built between 180-200AD. Over the centuries, Exeter was further influenced by the Saxons, Danes and the Normans. The development of the Cathedral was of particular note. The original Saxon building was burned down, replaced, and extensively modified in the 13th Century. At this time, the Cathedral Close was walled and gated to protect the priests. Some bomb damage was sustained during the Second World War, but this was relatively minor compared to the rest of the city. The nave & choir roof is the longest unsupported stonework vaulting in Europe. Elsewhere in the city, many old buildings remain, including the SPCK bookshop built in the early 15th century. The current Guildhall was started in 1330. and the supporting columns are made of granite from Blackingstone Quarry. Thorntons is a Tudor building, and the facades above Tesco & Lakeland are original, do take a look when you next shop in Exeter. Our thanks go to Mike for putting Exeter's architecture in its historical context.

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Unseasonal Weather-Global Warming?

Moretonhampstead- On Sunday we had a very fervent sun accompanied with a degree of heat such as at times seemed almost scalding with scarce a breath of air. Towards evening the sky became cloudy but still very sultry and as the day closed flashes of lightning were seen in a westerly direction and distant thunder was heard. This veered from the west to the south west evidently nearing the town. About 10 at night the lightning came in quick succession and extraordinary vividness- indeed presenting the appearance as if some silvery liquid were flowing through the streets while peals of thunder were awfully grand so close upon the earth as in the reverberation to cause the very houses to shake. The rain now began to fall and came down in torrents—a state of things that with short intervals continued for 2 to 3 hours. Between 2 and 3 o'clock on Monday morning the storm commenced anew, the peals of thunder being terrific and the lightning more vivid if possible than on the preceding night. The rain also poured down and this continued for some time. At North Boyev near this town where the storm was equally severe, two cows, one of them in calf and the other having a calf, the property of Mr Hole of that place, butcher, which were in a field, were found dead next morning close to the gateway. These had been seen lying in this place the preceding evening and it would appear must have been struck dead instantaneously as there was not the least appearance of their having struggled. It is said that a mark resembling a slight burn was to be seen across the cheek, passing on to Mr Hole who is a very steady and industrious young man not long in business the loss of these bullocks is very great, being estimated at not less than £25. At Chagford and Manaton also the storm was very violent.

Old Guide:


No, not a Girl Guide! I'm referring to an Official Guide to Moretonhampstead that was found some
