November Meeting:

On 21st of November 32 Members and guests attended a talk given by John Risdon, on the **Moorland Dart**. This was a very well presented talk which concentrated on the West Dart and its environs, prior to its confluence with the East Dart at Dartmeet. We learned a great deal about the formation of the moor some 290 million years ago, and why it looks as it does today. The frequent signs of occupation of the moor by man from way back in Neolithic times, were pointed out, by John, using his many excellent photos. The early attempts to cultivate the land were also explained. It was fascinating, also, to hear of the meeting of the Stannary Parliament at Crocken Tor, and about the ancient Wistmans Wood, which he described as 'one of the great wonders of Dartmoor'. When talking about Dartmoor Prison, John pointed out that 9,600 French & American were housed there, after it opened in 1808, It now holds about 600! He clearly has a great love of the Moor, which he was able communicate very effectively to us all. I'm sure we all look forward to his promised return to talk about the East Dart.


Moretonhampstead 1928:

I have been looking through a 'Guide to Moretonhampstead' published in 1928, which gives a snapshot of life here at that time, almost 80 years ago. Once again the guide features advertisements for many shops and premises trading at that time. **C.Withecombe, Grocer & Provision Dealer** in Station Road, was one of them, and promises: 'Quality Goods' Lowest Prices' 'Prompt Attention' and 'Quick Service'. The advert boasts a wide variety of provisions, near the bottom of which is, 'Jam Sandwiches'. Now can you get those at the Co-op I wonder? In addition, at the very bottom, 'Tourists

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Supplied with Meat Sandwiches at short notice'. What about the locals? could they have meat sandwiches, instead of Jam? Clearly tourism was just as important to local businesses then, as it is now. C. Withecombe was one of **six** shops selling groceries, in Moreton, there were also 3 butchers! Who knows, there may have been more that were not featured in the Guide of that year!
