September Meeting:

Our September meeting covered one of the most fascinating periods of Moreton's history. Barbie Thompson, drawing on both newly released national records and our local archives, looked at the impact of putting hundreds of parole prisoners here and at Ashburton during the Napoleonic wars. They were mainly Officers, some accompanied by their families and servants, who were billeted with local families on their word of honour ('parole') not to go more than a mile from the town centre. Of course some tried to escape and often a blind eye was turned to visits to Exeter. General Rochambeau caused a stir when he insisted on parading down Court St in full uniform on Napoleon's birthday. Generally, however, they were popular with Moretonians, especially when they gave lessons in French and dancing to young ladies. One of their black servants married a local girl and two have their burial stones in the church porch. Some prisoners stayed on after their release, notably the ancestor of the late Harry Rihll who ran the pharmacies here and at Chagford for many years.

Barbie has kindly agreed to write a booklet on the topic which will be available in the new archive centre at Green Hill next year. **Judy Hardiman**

A New Home For The Railway Model:

Many years ago, Peter Collier built a scale model of the Moretonhampstead Railway station. This model included all the Buildings, engine sheds, station, and of course the track layout. Council Clippings:

LETTER TO THE ROYAL HOUSEHOLD; DOCCOMBE EARLY CLOSING –The year is—1909
A Royal visit by the Prince of Wales to his Duchy estate on

Dartmoor caused some excitement for Councillors in 1909. At the May meeting the Clerk was instructed to write to the Royal Household to ask “if His Royal Highness would afford the gratification of his humble subjects in Moretonhampstead by stopping here for a few minutes on his way from Princetown to Exeter on the 10th June”. Hopes were however dashed a month later when the Duchy of Cornwall sent a reply that “owing to limited time, their Royal Highnesses would not be able to stop whilst passing through the town”. The Council immediately suggested that to show the loyalty of the town the streets should be decorated and gave orders for notices to be printed asking the inhabitants to do this. Also at the June meeting it was agreed with the Postmaster-General that the Doccombe sub-office would be closed from 2pm on Thursdays. In the November meeting, the Council agreed the Council chamber could be used by the following organisations when the Council was not using it: The Debating Society (Thursdays), Arts and Crafts Society (Mondays & Fridays) and the Chess Club (Wednesdays).
